

Lacey Act 2008 Amendments

- Covers more plants and plant products, including wood products
- Imposes legal requirements
- Requires an import declaration







Combatting Illegal Trade

- Illegal logging leads to:
 - Increased Greenhouse Emissions
 - Loss of Biodiversity
 - Deforestation
 - Corruption and Violence
 - Revenue losses for U.S. businesses










What are the Requirements?

All imported plants and plant products must have been legally harvested, possessed, sold or transported.

Articles imported under the act require a declaration stating:

- Value and quantity
- Country plant was taken
- Scientific name of each plant in product (Genus and species)





Does not require a declaration? Exemptions

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Common Cultivars and Common Food Crops



Common Cultivars and Common Food Crops (Data Table)



Commodities that are derived from common cultivars (except trees) and common food crops, including those listed in the below table, are excluded from the requirements of the Lacey Act and you can use a <u>disclaimer</u>. Plants and plant parts must meet all other regulatory requirements for importation into the United States. This list of common cultivars and common food crops is intended to be illustrative, not exhaustive.

Note: Can search by Common Name and Scientific Name

Common Cultivars and Common Food Crops

Exempted Parts indicates the plant parts covered by the exclusion. For example, apples are considered a common food crop, but wood from an apple tree is not. In some cases, the parts covered by the exclusion are broader than the commodity listed in The 'Commodity Type'. This is intentional, and parts listed in 'Exempted Parts' supersede the commodity listed in 'Commodity Type' for exclusion purposes.

Common Cultivars and Common Food Crops

- Send request to <u>Lacey.Act.Declaration@usda.gov</u>
- <u>Include:</u>
- Scientific name of the plant (genus, species)
- Common or trade names
- Annual trade volume (e.g.,cubic meters) or weight (e.g.,metric tons/kilograms) of the commodity
- Any other information that will help us make a determination, such as countries or regions where grown, estimated number of acres or hectares in commercial production, and so on




Exclusions do not apply to Protected Plants!

- Phase VIII composites






Lacey Act Program – Phase VII Update

- May 31, 2024 Notice published in the Federal Register with Phase VII HTS codes
- 4

- Comment Period open until 7/30/2024
- Implementation Date is December 1, 2024

Bottom line:

If the HTS code is flagged for Lacey, you will need species and country of harvest information for:

- Articles containing wood or plant products
- Plant products not 100% composite material that are not otherwise exempted
